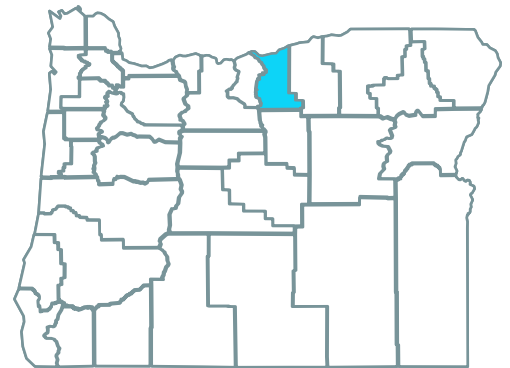


Wheat Field Wind

Wheat Field Wind is located in Gilliam County near the city of Arlington in Oregon. The site spans approximately 8,500 acres of private ranchland that overlooks the windswept banks of the Columbia River Gorge.

Energy security

Wind energy and land use

Wind turbines have a minimal land footprint, leaving approximately **98% of leased land available** for continued farming, wildlife habitat, ranching, or recreation.²

Wind energy supports American manufacturing

The U.S. wind industry supports a robust domestic supply chain, with **more than 450 factories and over 130,000 American jobs** nationwide.³

Wheat Field's environmental impact

This project will conserve **over 172 million gallons** of water annually and reduce air pollution linked to smog and acid rain.⁴

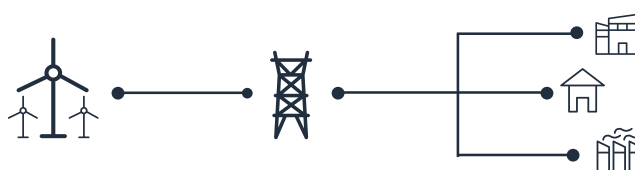

How wind energy works

EDPR NA uses wind turbines to harness the natural resource of wind to generate mechanical energy. This energy is transformed into electricity via a generator and is sent to the electrical grid after being converted to the proper voltage.



As one of the **most cost-effective energy sources available** today, wind energy already provides at least **25% of electricity generation** in eight U.S. states.^{6,7}
